

<u>Stye</u>

What is a Stye?

A stye is an infection at the base of an eyelash, hair follicle. It can develop on the inside or outside of the eyelid. A stye will often look like a red bump and may be tender. It is usually harmless.

How long will it last?

A stye usually forms a head and looks like a pimple in 3-5 days. In a few more days, it will drain and heal. Sometimes they can last for months or recur, however, the treatment is usually the same.

Stye Treatment:

- 1. Put a clean, warm, wet washcloth on the eye for 10 minutes 4 times a day. This helps the stye localize, not spread, and come to a head sooner.
- 2. Massage during and after the warm compress can help it open.
- 3. For recurrent styes, we will sometimes use antibiotic drops to apply to the eyelid to try and prevent future styes.
- 4. Rarely do styes need surgical intervention.

When to call:

- The eyelid becomes very red, swollen or painful.
- The eye itself becomes pink or red and looks infected.
- Your child develops a fever.
- Your child is having recurrent styes.
